FROM THE MANSE

June 2015

Hello once again my dear friends.

The votes are in and counted and the politicians are off to Westminster, so if the party you support got in – congratulations, and if they did not – commiserations, but the nation has chosen! The Presbytery has chosen me as interim moderator for Arbirlot Church linked with Carmyllie Church as Rev Stewart Lamont prepares for his retirement and by the time you read this I will have had my first Kirk Session meeting with the elders at these churches. This position will impact on the amount of work that I do in East and Old in a small way so I pray that you will support me in this role and that you will keep both these churches in your prayers also.

As I write this letter I am getting ready to attend the 2015 General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. This is not a favourite part of my remit as a minister but all ministers should take up their commission when their turn comes around (at least it is only every four years). The Church of Scotland cannot operate without decisions being made and like all Presbyterian decisions some people will agree with the decisions while others will not – decision making by committees is being Presbyterian! This is also the case with our own Kirk Session in East and Old. Varied opinions are put forward; sometimes there is discussion while on other matters no discussion appears to be necessary. My job as moderator of the Kirk Session is to chair the meeting and also to make sure any rules and regulations are not broken. It also gives me a chance to share my vision for East and Old Parish Church which I hope and pray will take us and future generations into another new century.

A number of our elders are getting that bit older and their mobility is not as good as it used to be. The Kirk Session took the decision that more elders are required to keep our church functioning well and looking after our members. A number of names were suggested by the Session members who over the next few weeks/ months will be approached by either myself, Bob Kidd or Margaret Scrimgeour. Can I ask that you do not dismiss it out of hand if you are approached but find out what the job really entails – eldership in the 21st Century has moved a long way from the traditional roles of many years ago?

One of the decisions that the Kirk Session took many months ago now was to send some of our youths to our twinning church – Zuglo Church – for their annual summer camp and hopefully they will come back with lots of ideas to inspire us. Karen Liddle is taking three youths over; Liam Rattray, Jack Wilson and Ellen Wilson and we wish them a safe journey and a great time.

On that note can I wish you all a very happy, relaxing and refreshing summer break but keep your eyes open as we have a few new ventures starting during the summer and you will find out more later in this edition.

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

THE MAUNDY THURSDAY



service in the church was relatively well attended but more people would have been better but thank you to the 40+ people who attended this reflective service and cele-HOLY brated the Sacrament of Holy Communion – although Barbara Ann did state on the evening it was not Communion – it was the Last Supper that was celebrated.

On Good Friday members of the congregation walked in to find a coffin at the front of the church with unlit candles in the shape of a large cross on top of the coffin. The candles were lit during the eulogy for the followers who followed Jesus in his ministry and after they were all lit they were then blown out one by one as his followers let him down that final week. This service then became like a funeral service for Jesus with a eulogy being read. This was once again a very moving service. At this service we were joined by the boys and leaders of the Company section of our Boys' Brigade and we were delighted to have them there.

As you know Barbara Ann talks about the fact that most people come to church on Palm Sunday and then not again until Easter Day and miss such an important part of Christ's story and life. The boys were a bit disappointed to find that the coffin lid was screwed shut because they had wanted to try it out!!!

EASTER SUNDAY

what a busy day it was for East and Old Church. There was the early morning service at the Lochside at 8am organised by FACT and thank you to Isabel Farquharson for being our rep in organising this service. Then it was a quick hop up to the church for the 9.30am early morning service with communion which was well attended. It was so good to see familiar children and visiting children coming along for the service at 11am and we wondered if the Easter



Egg hunt had anything to do with it. The children went away with loads and loads of Crème Eggs!!! Bill Duthie did manage to find three eggs that the children had not found the following week.

COMMUNION



Once again the Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated on the fourth Sunday of April. Now the date should never surprise anyone because communion is AL-WAYS held on the fourth Sunday of April and October so it was a little disappointing that the numbers were down by approximately 30 people but there again there was still 210 people worshipping God and celebrating communion. The evening

communion service was well attended with over 60 people being present. Barbara Ann would like to thank everyone for coming along and a special thank you to all the office bearers for the setting up on the Saturday night and also the serving of communion on Sunday morning.

RETIRING OFFERING

As you are aware on communion Sunday we normally have a retiring offering in aid of the Fabric Fund for the church however Barbara Ann sought the Kirk Session's approval to change this on the day to an offering for Nepal which was devastated by the earthquake. The retiring offering was taken at both services on 26th April and then at the following two services on 3rd May and a wonderful total of £1269 was received and has been sent off to the Disasters Emergency Committee.

AFTERNOON COMMUNION

The Kirk Session realise that some of our members have a problem getting out for 11am on a Sunday morning due to a variety of reasons therefore an afternoon communion was arranged for Sunday 10th May where everyone present could bring along their communion cards and then stay for tea/coffee and cake after the service. Once again this was well attended with over 40 people present.

EAPPI

stands for Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel and one of their representatives Rebecca McGonagall who works for the Church of Scotland at 121 George Street, Edinburgh came along and gave a very interesting and informative talk and presentation about her 3 months presentation you then realise how much worse it actually is. You can be an EAPPI volunteer until the age of

70 so some of you might like to think about taking a 3 month sabbatical and going out to monitor human rights issues.

THE MUSIC CAFÉ

continues to be a popular event in the church for people with dementia and their carers. However, many of the helpers also get so much from helping out at the Music Café and we are always on the lookout for more volunteers. Pat Brodlie and Maureen Black do a great job at the Music Café along with Margaret Anderson on the piano and helped by Bruce Simpson.

COSY CORNER

is proving to be a busy little café with soup and sandwiches. However, we **URGENT-LY** need another one if not two volunteers to help out. If you don't make soup then you can do sandwiches and vice versa. Please think about helping out folks because this café is popular and is part of the mission of this church in Christ's name. There

must be two people in the Roll of over 800 people who can help out. Please speak to Barbara Ann or Jean Alexander.

FRIDAY FLING

is a great activity for people with dementia and their carers. The physical exercise helps in numerous ways along with the companionship and the tea and cake half way through. This venture only operates every two weeks so it is not an onerous task and once again we **URGENTLY** need two people to come on

this rota. At present people are on the rota once every 6-8 weeks. It does not matter whether you can dance or not as some of the people just walk/shuffle on the dance floor – and we mean some of the helpers!!! Please speak to Barbara Ann or Jean Alexander.

THE FAITH DISCUSSION GROUP

is held once a month and has a steady participation from the people who attend. They have covered numerous topics during the last few months but will take a two month break during July and August. Is there a topic you would like to discuss or find out more about in relation to a life of faith? Just let someone in the group know.





DROP AND SHOP

This was supposed to be an aid for mums, dads and carers to help them out while they were shopping. Our research showed that parents and carers were interested in this new initiative but after 3 months there has still been no one to this venture. We have now stopped the club until September and will re-launch it then because the research was carried out in the Autumn last year when parents and carers were maybe starting Christmas Shopping and there was more demand for it then.

THE CHILDREN'S FILM CLUB



is proving to be pretty popular with a number of children attending who have no connection with the church. A small band of volunteers help out at these events and the children receive a drink, snack and popcorn and is held on the second Saturday of every month at 3pm. Can you help supervise the children? We need extra helpers so please volunteer.

FILM NIGHT

is run by Mary Daun and is held in the session room on the third Saturday of every month. During April to September the films will be shown at 6pm and from October to March they will be shown at 2pm in the afternoon.

The steering group consists of 10 office bearers of East and Old with the remit to raise funds for our big renovations. VISIT TO THE SCOTTISH PARLIAMENT

Over 20 members of the Church enjoyed a visit to the Scottish Parliament on Thursday 26th March, following an early-morning bus trip from Forfar.

The visit was arranged following an earlier visit by members accompanying our twinning-friends from Zuglo Church, Budapest, as a result of which M.S.P. Nigel Don offered to arrange a similar visit for members of the East & Old.

We departed on a rather dull, wet morning and, after a slow-stop journey through Dundee traffic and a view of the third Forth bridge under construction, we enjoyed a morning 'cuppa' in the Parliamentary restaurant before meeting Mr Don and his assistant, Mafalda Morley.

We then had a brief introduction to Parliamentary committee procedure by Mr. Don, who is one of the chair persons of Parliamentary committees. This was in one of the committee rooms, so members of the group were able to sit in the seats normally occupied by MSP's while Mr. Don explained how committees operate and take soundings on proposed legislative initiatives. Thereafter we had a tour of the building and the special features of the construction and decoration were all fully explained by Parliamentary guides.

The highlight of the trip, however, was a visit to the debating chamber itself, where we watched as the various ministers were quizzed with regard to a wide range of issues before First Minister Nicola Sturgeon came into the chamber to face questions from representatives of all the other parties on even more subjects! The proceedings were very well managed, and although there were occasional noisy outbursts from members of the various opposition parties, the to-and-fro of the Question Time session appeared to be a less noisy affair than the equivalent in the House of Commons.

Members of the group were able to have lunch in the restaurant before free time in the city, exploring the nearby Royal Mile.

Our thanks to Mr. Don and his assistant, Mafalda, for their arrangements, have been passed on.
