Minister:

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My dear friends

Once again it is that time! Time for another letter for the Steeple Times! I know that time passes quickly but this letter is the one thing that seems to appear far more than 6 times a year! Since the last edition it has been a very busy time for me personally. There was the trip to Zuglo in Hungary, then I had a week off which I spent in London with the girls in my family, a two day conference in Coatbridge for World Mission, I hosted a guest 'Bishal' from Nepal, four members of the Russian Choir plus two weekends of family and friends visiting and then everything else I do, and I know that I am not alone. I know of the many activities that quite a number of our members are involved in both inside the church community and also in the Forfar wider community as well as coping with the pressures of family life and work life also. In this time of Advent as we approach Christmas we are told to prepare, to stop and reflect and less of the rushing about but although we hear this message and know that is exactly what we should be doing the outside world takes over and its back to card writing, shopping, wrapping, eating, drinking, partying and the list goes on and on and on. And after the rush of Christmas parties, visiting, eating and drinking too much, we then sit down to think about our New Year resolutions which are very rarely followed through.

What I would like you to do if you can spare a few moments is to read and re-read the following bible passage from Mark 12:28-31. ²⁸ One of the teachers of the law came and heard them debating. Noticing that Jesus had given them a good answer, he asked him, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?" ²⁹ "The most important one," answered Jesus, "is this: 'Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. ³⁰ Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' ³¹ The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as your-self.' There is no commandment greater than these."

I believe the members and friends of East and Old Parish Church follow these commands that Jesus have given us. Over this last year we have been frantically raising funds for our renovation project which we hope will be starting in late March 2016. Some of the fund raising ideas have really caught your imaginations and you have given money and attended events while other events have been attended but could have done quite a bit better. But it is not just about ourselves is it? It is about our neighbours and we have responded to that too and I want to take this opportunity to say thank you very much indeed for all you do. The clothing and food for the refugees, the money for Doctors without Borders, all the bag loads of food at Harvest, the money in the Salvation Army envelopes, the huge donation to the earthquake appeal for Nepal, money for Poppy Scotland and Erskine Hospital, the Leprosy Mission, Free to Live (FACT Charity for 2015/2016), Cancer Research and the many other charities we have given smaller donations to. Our Guild and BB have responded to my challenge to 'Build a House in Nepal' and are actively raising funds for this also. East and Old will be tackling this challenge early in the New Year also.

Whenever we do extra collections of money, food or clothing the responsibility lands on a few people; Mabel Martin and the counting teams and Bill and I rene Duthie being some of the few and we thank them very much indeed. So once again I would like to say thank you very much for all you contribute from the smallest donations to the biggest donations – they all count and I know some people feel they give a lot to the church but think about what you have given already? Has it stopped you going out, buying food, paying your bills? Do you still have some money left at the end of the week or the month? Then you haven't really missed that donation from your pocket and think of the impact that it has made on other people's lives. Thank you God for our overabundance, thank you God for the opportunity to help and share with others, thank you God for bringing Jesus into our lives and showing us 'the way, the truth and the life.'

'LET US BUILD A HOUSE'

Barbara Ann of course is part of the World Mission Council at 121 in Edinburgh and that is why we are so fortunate to be meeting lots and lots of oversea visitors in the last few years. The World Mission Council have launched the programme 'Let us build a house' in Nepal in which Barbara Ann is playing a big part in and hopes our church will help out too. This is a three year programme with the money being raised during 2015/2016 and then the following year hearing about the houses and communities where they are being built and by the third year seeing how the lives of the families have been affected and what they are doing to build up their new communities.

Barbara Ann has visited the Guild and told them about this project and also the Boys' Brigade and we here in the church will be hearing far more about it soon. How many houses at a cost £500 each can East and Old build?

DATA PROTECTION

Every member on the church roll has been given a data form for completion. This is to fall in line with the Church of Scotland's policy on data protection where you the members must sign the form to say that you are happy with East and Old Church to hold information on you.

At present we hold all names and addresses of our members, some phone numbers and some emails and you the member will have signed the form to say that is okay. Your names and addresses are kept on file by the minister, session clerk and roll keeper, elders have names and addresses for their districts and occasionally your name and addresses may be given to the flower distributors. For those of you who pay through the banking system for either your offering or the improvement fund out treasurer has a copy of your names and addresses also.

There appeared to be a few people who misunderstood the form that was given out for you to sign thinking that we were asking you to pay more money but that was not the case – we simply need your consent to hold your details on our data base. Thank you to everyone who has replied already!

CHILDREN'S FILM CLUB

The steering group has been coming up with innovative ideas in ways to raise more money for the improvements in the church.

We have now applied to 3 trusts in the hope of gaining grants from their governing bodies but it is a long and slow process but well worth it hopefully in the end.

The steering group applied to the Presbytery for a reduction in our Ministry and Mission allowance this year because of the fund raising we have been involved in, the work that is being done in the church to modernise it and our mission outlook to the community of Forfar and we are

delighted to inform you that our Ministry and Mission allocation that we pay to 121 has this year been reduced by £12,500 with the said £12,500 going into the DIF Fund. Do you know of any organisations that give out grants to churches – if so, let us know please!

Presbytery, CARTA and the General Trustees have all agreed to our renovation project which we hope will commence on **MONDAY 28**TH **MARCH 2016** which is Easter Monday. A lot still depends on finance over the next few months but the General Trustees have offered us a loan if there is any shortfall in our finances. We will be allowed to claim back a certain amount of tax because of the work we are doing and we believe if that money comes through it will pay the loan back to 121.

Just to reassure everyone our finances have been given a thorough examination of what we have and where we plan to get the rest of the money from by the General Trustees. Needless to say there is a lot more information that is available if you are interested in hearing about it but the magazine is not the place for that. So to that end we will hold an evening of preparation for the members of the church in **FEBRUARY/MARCH** for you to come along and find out more about what has been happening, look at the plans again, ask some questions and then find out the next steps in the renovations. If everything goes to plan we will hold our last service in the current format on Easter Sunday and then re-open hopefully in October which is 7 months later.

Morning worship will be held in the church hall as will all our fund raising activities. The choir room, session room and kitchen will be available on most occasions but this will be worked out in conjunction with the architects and builders.

Barbara Ann has contacted St Margaret's and Lowson Memorial to ask for use of their buildings for any church funerals.

ECO-CONGREGATION AWARD

The Church of Scotland's HIV Programme is currently supporting 29 projects in 16 countries of the world.

TWINNING VISIT TO BUDAPEST from Karen Liddle

Early on the 8th October, 18 members of East & Old set off for Budapest, Hungary to visit our twin church in Zuglo Reformed Church in Budapest. After numerous pick-ups all around Forfar we were on our way but after hitting rush-hour traffic, parking in the wrong car park and then a problem with our checked in bags we had to run through the terminal building as our flight was boarding!

We were met at the airport by a small welcome party and took taxis to our hotel before having lunch in the city. After a short sightseeing walk around the city we took over the underground trains and the trams as we travelled en masse to Zuglo for an evening welcome dinner. We were all made very welcome and met by several members of the congregation. A lovely buffet meal was provided for us, made and served by the ladies of the church, it was just like at home with the ladies keeping busy in the kitchen looking after us all.

On Friday we were up early for a sightseeing trip to two nearby towns: Szentendre, a picturesque town on the banks of the Danube with lots of artisan craft shops and then on to Visegrad for a tour of the medieval castle, which was a great insight into Hungarian history. On the way home we carried on the medieval theme with lunch in a medieval themed restaurant, complete with waiting staff in costume, musicians, terracotta crockery and traditional medieval food! Such an unforgettable experience!

In the evening some of the group went for a night tour of the Buda part of the city and saw St Mattias church, the castle and Fisherman's Bastion by night.

On Saturday we were up early again for a trip to another town and another castle! After a morning's sightseeing we headed for a nearby vineyard for a wine-tasting tour and lunch. Lots and lots of goulash and lots and lots of wine! Not being big drinkers, some of our group were not coping so well with so much alcohol and we all needed a rest on the bus journey back.

On Sunday we headed back to Zuglo for morning worship. Thinking it would be quiet on the underground early Sunday morning we were shocked when hundreds of runners for the Budapest marathon all got on at one stop and we were well and truly crushed! Morning worship was lovely and again we were made so welcome. Barbara Ann delivered the sermon, which Mihaly, chair of Budapest Twinning group, elder, church organist and interpreter extraordinaire ably interpreted into Hungarian. During the service our very own Bob Kidd gave a presentation talking about the work of E & O and our mission to do God's work in the community. We were then treated to some beautiful singing by the youth of the church who had come back into the church especially, following their lessons. Afterwards, I presented Mihaly a gift on behalf of East & Old to Zuglo church, an engraved vase with pictures of both churches etched on the glass. Following the service, we all spent the afternoon with host families from the congregation and all returned later full of stories of wonderful food, hospitality and fun from our generous hosts. We were then treated to an evening of traditional Hungarian folk dancing, singing, history, poetry from the congregation, the local primary school and guests. Following this we had more food and drink and then, finally we signed the formal twinning agreement.

This has been the work of 3 years of correspondence and 2 trips to Budapest and 1 reciprocal visit to Forfar so far and is a big step in our twinning journey. Of course, this meant lots of photos had to be taken by lots of people and was not enjoyable for those of us who are camera shy!!

After so much hospitality from all at Zuglo, Monday meant a little respite for most of the congregation, but 3 brave members met us on Monday morning to provide guided tours around the city. We split into 2 groups and then all met up again for lunch and to say a final goodbye to our Zuglo hosts. We took a tour of the Parliament building in the afternoon followed by free time for the rest of the day. This meant lots of coffee stops to get in from the cold! In the evening some of us went to a Folklore show at the theatre, some went to an organ recital in the Basilica and some of us went on the "Budapest eye" big wheel. A fun evening was had by all.

On Tuesday there was only time for couple of hours of free time before we had to take our taxis to the airport ready for the return journey home. A fantastic time was had by all, new friend-ships forged, twinning links strengthened and renewed enthusiasm for sharing our faith with others. Another successful trip and another great achievement for East & Old in officially becoming a twinned church.

As a minister I am interested in the various aspects of other churches life, their doctrine, their theology, how they interpret the word of God, their beliefs, and how they do church. Our link with Zuglo Church has been very informative and interesting with Janos and Noemi the pastors in Zuglo and myself discussing different parts of the liturgy that we use, hymn selections, the various bible passages that we choose for different events and especially the rules and regulations of our churches.

Another aspect to the twinning is that the Church of Scotland is the national church in Scotland which comes with different laws and traditions which Zuglo Church do not have being a minority church in Hungary. Another aspect I am interested in learning more about from Zuglo is in the area of a gathered church which means a large percentage of the members do not live in the immediate vicinity but travel to the church each week whereas in Forfar that is not the case, we have a few who travel into Forfar but the majority of our members live in Forfar. We in East and Old are gaining so much information on their work with children and youths and in turn

Zuglo are learning so much from us about the community aspect of church. I am delighted that East and Old have now signed the formal twinning agreement and look forward to learning more from our new friends in Christ. The twinning team have done a remarkable job over these last few years and I would like to thank them very much for giving us this opportunity.
