FROM THE MANSE

Dear Friends

February 2016

A Happy and Peaceful New Year to all the members and friends of East and Old although it feels like Christmas and New Year were about 3 months ago if not longer!!! But what an exciting January it has turned out to be with our 225 celebrations. The evening meal on the 16th was a super night (except for the heating breaking down!) with food, entertainment and great service which you will read more about in this issue. The following Saturday was the 225 Coffee Morning which was well attended and it is super to see and hear the buzz as people get the chance to sit and relax and chat in friendship and fellowship.

At the time of writing this letter I have just had a conversation on the telephone with the moderator of the Church of Scotland the Right Rev Dr Angus Morrison who will be preaching in the church on 31st January and in attendance will be his wife, dignitaries and officials from Angus, three of our church friends from Zuglo Church in Hungary, representatives of the other churches in Forfar, school and youth representatives and many more including family and friends of our members and of course the members are looking forward to welcoming back Rev Graham Norrie.

As your minister I do go on a bit about the bible being written for communities and how a faith community should interact with each other, with other people of faith, those who have none and with the community and world around us. In the month of January we have been very much working in this aspect of God's mission. Once again over the last 5 weeks or so my bible passages and sermons have focused on one subject - change! As I said in one of my sermons change is good - as long as it is not happening with you! We celebrate 225 years of the current building of East and Old but there again there has been lots of changes in the last 225 years and not just in the last 5 years!!! The steeple, bells and clock were added and when the organ was put in I am sure that many elders of the Kirk Session at the time would not have been happy with it going in - it meant disturbing and altering the shape of the sanctuary, an extension being built and a lot of upheaval. The stained glass windows were a new addition after that but in the days gone by the bigger the better was the philosophy which in today's climate means many old large buildings, which are a nightmare to heat and keep wind and water tight, are not functional for 21st Century worship and use. As you know our steering group has been working very hard to raise the funds for the new improvements to the church and we are nearly there but there is still a shortfall which they hope to address by seeking some more grants. Applying for the grants is a complicated business because of the restrictions that are involved but the main restriction we have come across is that we need planning permission in place before we submit our applications. We hope to have this within the next month. If all goes well the church will close on Monday 28th March for approximately 7 months with worship taking place in the Church Hall. The steering group plan to hold an evening in March to which all members are invited to give the updated news and information about the building plans and proposed closing down of the sanctuary. A date has been pencilled in for Thursday 3rd March at 7pm in the Church but this date will be confirmed nearer the time. Change, fresh expression, innovation, vision and faith are some of the key ingredients that keep a church alive and thriving and that is why East and Old is a vibrant, lively and active church which we hope and pray will still be standing and in use over the next 225 years!

There's a well known saying that, 'Cometh the hour, cometh the man...' and this is very true when considering Bob Kidd's time as East & Old's Session Clerk. Bob took up office in November 2007 at the start of a period of vacancy. Although he was an experienced and respected Elder, nothing could have prepared Bob for this difficult time. However, he worked well and closely with several Interim Moderators and our Locum Minister, while constantly ensuring that Office Bearers and members of the congregation were kept fully informed about what was happening.

As well as being Session Clerk, Bob was involved in many practical projects to do with the smooth running of the church and served as Chairman of the Nominating Committee a tricky task, especially when it seemed that we were never going to get a Minister. Bob has done just about everything for E&O and it's almost impossible to distinguish what he has done as Session Clerk from everything else which he has done for us! He has added a professional touch to anything musical or dramatic; has used his creative and artistic flair for 'Busy Hands'; has devised many a fund raising quiz; has been one of the Media Team responsible for preparing the material to be shown via the monitors; has taken part in and sometimes led the Care Home services and the mid-week service; has acted as a very necessary buffer between the congregation and either Presbytery or '121'; has drawn up many monthly diary sheets as well as numerous agendas for Kirk Session and Conveners' Meetings and has penned countless letters on our behalf. Bob has also done all of the liaison with people in this country and abroad as we seek a new home for our renowned Organ.

One important area of responsibility, unseen by most members, has been that of record keeping – near the start of each year the roll has to be revised and attested and shortly after this all of the congregation's records such as the minute book, the communion roll, the property register and the Accounts need to be assembled for Presbytery inspection and approval. Not all congregations manage to do this by the appointed time but thanks to Bob's efforts E&O has always done so and this was the case even one year when Bob had just had an unforeseen hospital stay. Whether the task has been great or small, Bob has afforded each the same degree of diligence and attention to detail. Perhaps not surprising in someone who has worked as a teacher and as a driving instructor, one of Bob's most notable strengths has been that of communication: he has been able to get on with absolutely everyone and has always been thoughtful, approachable and good humoured while having the respect of young and old.

Our Minister is absolutely indispensable but we at E&O have been secure in the knowledge that if Barbara Ann were for some reason unavailable, Bob Kidd would be able to hold the fort.

We will miss your sure and steadfast leadership, Bob!

PARKING AT THE CHURCH




There are two available car spaces beside the east door of the church for members with poor mobility.
