My dear friends

Advent Bible Study

The advent bible studies this year followed a day by day theme that was created by Alternativity in conjunction with Spill the Beans. and the discussions were all based around Matthew 1:18-25

This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy communications Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from

the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

him Immanuel" (which means "God with us"). When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. But he did not consummate their marriage until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.


be put out so well done to the members of East and Old for coming out on the 1st January to worship and praise our Lord.

### WHAT'S COMING UP & WHAT TO LOOK

### **OUT FOR**

February is to be our 'Take Up and Step Up Challenge' to the congregation which will be led by our walking group. We hope as many people in the church will take part from the young to the elderly. We are still running our £1 million challenge to raise funds for the refurbishment of the church so in the month of February we will be undertaking the 2 million step challenge. At the end of each week we ask those who are taking part: people walking to shops, around the loch or the town, delivering the Steeple Times etc to either email or phone Billy Sweetin with the number of steps they have taken that week and all the names and steps taken will put onto a counting board. If your mobile phone does not have a step counter or you do not have a fit bit or a pedometer just let Billy know your normal route and then he will work out the average number of steps your route normally takes. The walking group will be undertaking a walk every Saturday in February and we are confident that 2 million steps will be reached. We will be linking this funding for our renovations so we ask that you pick up a sponsor form or donate money to the church sponsor form for this venture. Barbara Ann has said to Billy that she will give him £100 sponsor money if he completes 100,000 steps himself – however after the past week while counting his steps to get an idea of the number steps involved Barbara Ann has reduced this £50 for every 100,000 steps Billy completes in February! The Sweetin family are involved in this venture too but remember Barbara Ann runs 5K three times a week, both their children attend the gym with both children walking a lot as a police officer and a nurse! We can see this venture being a bit competitive in the Sweetin household! The Groovy Gryphons and our Boy's Brigade Company will be involved too.

Did you know that someone worked out that in the three years of Jesus ministry he walked 3,125 miles? Therefore, after the 2 million

steps have been completed our minister would like us to match the distance that Jesus walked – 5,500,000 steps! There is no dead line for that at the moment you will be glad to hear! Watch out though Barbara Ann is talking about walking the length of the equator – 50,000,000 steps. We are instructed to Care for God's Creation so walking to the shops instead of taking the car cuts down on emissions, Care for Creation includes taking care of ourselves and our fitness and it will help us raise funds – three in one – what a great deal that is!

During **February** our minister has **three talks**; **21**<sup>st</sup>, **22**<sup>nd</sup> **and 23**<sup>rd</sup> **February** in Letham, St Margaret's and Dunoon respectively – what a busy lady she is going to be with her talks on Malawi and Jane Haining.

### **SOUPER SUNDAY**

Souper Sunday was an idea by the Church of Scotland many years ago and is still running today to promote and support the work of the HIV/AIDS charity. Therefore on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> February the worship service will be based on this subject followed by a SOUP lunch which is being organised by the Education Committee of the church. There will be a donation bowl for any donations for the soup and bread on the day. Please stay behind after the church service for some food and companionship and show East and Old's support for this worthwhile campaign.

Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> February in the Church Hall at 7pm is an evening organised by the church called 'TIME FOR ME' The cost is £7 per ticket with a maximum of 25 tickets being on sale. Pam Duthie and her friend Carolyn Brown will give one to ne advice on hair styles and products and 'Bow Naturals' skin products along with Stella and Dot jewellery will be on display and available to buy. During the evening there will be tea/coffee/wine/juice, pancakes (now we wonder why?) and nibbles.

### RENOVATION UPDATE

Over the last couple of weeks we have been showing on the screens in the hall photographs of how the renovation work has been progressing. When you see the photographs you realise why it is costing so much money! The builders have told us they expect to be finished by mid-February although we have added in a bit of extra time just in case! Once the builders move out our men and women will move in to get the church ready for the grand opening in March 2017 (said with a prayer, fingers and toes crossed!) No date has been set yet but look out for the information of the Dedication Service on the first Sunday the new sanctuary is in use. The decoration schedule has just been issued providing the specifications for floor coverings and wall / ceiling colour schemes. This is a major project milestone bringing us closer to a handover date.
