## FROM THE MANSE

Letter from the Manse

#### Hello my dear friends!

Well it has been a very busy time since I last wrote to you in the April edition of the Steeple Times especially since I need to write the letter in the middle of the month before! Our newly refurbished church had just re-opened - that was a big event in the life of the church and also in my life. The next big event for Billy and I was the wedding of our son Scott to his fiancé Suzanne held 22nd April on the banks of Loch Lomond. Just like the opening of the church there was a big build up to the actual day and then the wedding itself and you will be glad to hear that I held it together during the ceremony. I arrived in my mother-of-the-groom outfit and then it was off with the coat and hat and the cassock put on, however I had forgotten to take my dog collar with me so one was guickly made out of white cardboard! As soon as the ceremony was finished the coat and hat were back on! Billy and I had a wonderful day with our family and friends and the sun shone! The happy couple left the next day for their honeymoon and Billy and I left the day after for a break to Prague which proved to be another highlight and we would recommend it if you have not been before.

The reason I am mentioning the church re-opening and the wedding is that when there is a big build up to an event and a lot of time and effort has gone into something there can be a feeling of flatness and tiredness after the big event. I know that I was very tired after the church re-opened as were many of our church members, I got the same feeling after the wedding and holiday were over. My son and daughter-in-law have returned from their three week honeymoon and are talking excitedly about the wedding and photographs while the rest of us are already passed the event. And that brings us to the church building because many people think that the big opening is passed, and that is that, however that is not the case my friends. As church members and friends of East and Old we need your prayers because there is still on-going work in the church by our own men to supplement the work of the builders and as many of you will know we have been having issues with our sound system. As I write this letter the sound engineer was out this morning and we are praying that the issue will now be resolved.

I also need your feedback regarding the loop system in the church. I invited along a number of people who wear hearing aids to sit in various sections of the church and put their hearing aid to the loop position. I used all the different microphones and the members moved about the sanctuary, all could hear clearly and there was no problem. However I was unable to contact three people who were having problems with the loop system. Can I ask that if people are having a problem with the loop system or anything else then please speak to me.

In this edition you will hear of exciting new plans that we hope will further God's word and mission in East and Old and in the Forfar community but to do that, and more, we need the members of East and Old to take action in a number of ways. Also in this issue our treasurer has given a report but in a nut shell we bring in £7000 a month through offerings, standing orders and lets and our basic outgoings to 121 George Street and utility bills come to £7500 and that is before we spend anything on repairs and upgrades to the church, church halls, BB Hall and manse and then there is the day to day running of the church including licences for copyright permission and the leasing of the printer and our paper supplies and, and, and ....

We are raising funds to pay off a loan that we needed to complete phase one and our Steering Group have already started applying for grants for phase 2 because we want and need to finish this project sooner rather than later. In addition to finance we need the members of East and Old to offer up their time and talents. We **URGENTLY** need volunteers for a number of our projects and we need skilled people to help out in a variety of areas. In the near future you will see a talents board going up in the church building. On the board will be the various areas where we require and NEED people to volunteer to use their time and or skills and I pray that as members you will respond to it. You always hear me saying God's work never ends well here it is again - GOD'S WORK NEVER ENDS!

Can I take this opportunity to say thank you very much for the people in the church who do offer their time and talents to the running and upkeep of the church which saves us considerable money and special thanks must go to the members of East and Old who took up my challenge in the February edition of the Steeple Times to attend church more regularly because members have responded and our weekly attendances have increased slightly.

The tiredness has gone and after the summer we are ready for action once again so come and follow Jesus not only in your attendance at worship but in the work he command us to undertake.

### WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING



We are pleased to inform you that the church has started a weekly prayer group which is held in the sanctuary. The prayer group meets on a Wednesday morning at 11am and also on a Sunday morning at 10.15am to 10.30am. Numbers are low at the moment because not that many people know it is on but prayer is vital in your life of faith so we urge you to consider coming along to either or both these meetings.

#### Creating a culture on invitation -

was an event that six of our members attend at Hampden Park in March. It was an interesting conference with points being raised about why people do not come to church and why they do. The biggest point of interest was that people who do attend the church very rarely invite another person to church and it is usually because of the fear of rejection. Stepping over the threshold of a church when you are not used it can be very daunting so have we offered to pick them up or meet them at the door? You just never know who will say yes and come along.



The Leprosy Mission Coffee morning was once again well attended by all the churches in

Forfar and over £600 was raised for the funds and more awareness raised about this disease.

**Stated Annual Meeting** – our SAM was held after morning worship on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> April and for all the legalistic people out there the rules were changed last year that our SAM no longer needed to be completed by end March so we took advantage of this new rule and held the meeting in April!

**During Holy Week** our minister tried something different on the Monday to Wednesday by holding a 'Stations of the Passion'. At each of the stations which were set up in the sanctuary with low lighting there was a bible passage, a prayer and an activity. Over the three nights there were 25 people who attended and the feedback was very positive.



The service was held in the social area of the church and a meal was taken during the service. For the last 10 minutes of the service everyone moved into the sanctuary to sit or stand in the garden of Gethsemane which Marlene and Bob Sim had designed and put up. Once again people found the service moving and enjoyable.

**Good Friday Service** was well attended also and the whole service was taken in the dark with only some spotlights on and of course our illuminated cross. Once again people gave very positive feedback on this service and credit must be given to the minister for her thought provoking and inspiring services throughout Holy Week.

#### Easter Morning - what a

wonderful day – Jesus is risen, he is risen indeed! The morning started for a few of our members at the FACT Lochside Service with members of the other churches and then our own service at 11am. Floppy the donkey was a great hit and thanks to Bill Duthie and Fiona Clacher for the props.

**Communion Sunday** – as you know we moved this service back one week to accommodate the minister's family wedding and we also held three services that day -11am, 2.30pm and 6.30pm. All the services were well attended and the tea and cake after the 2.30pm service was a big hit once again! You could have come to all three services and heard three different bible passages, sermons and communions - the minister really was working overtime! We want to give you advance notice -October has five Sunday's so remember communion is on the fourth Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> October!

**Big Day Out 4** – this event, run by Presbytery, was held in our church this year and it turned out to be a big success for those attending however the whole event could have been better attended by the many, many members of the churches in Angus presbytery. The theme for this year was 'on the margins' and the workshops revolved around people and situations who are on the margins of society; prison chaplaincy, people with Dementia and their carers, accessible worship for people with various levels of hearing loss, the work of cross reach in dealing with mental health, a carpentry school to help the unemployed and workplace chaplaincy to name some of them. Our new look church went down a treat with very favourable comments and the biggest applaud of the day was for our social team who were led by Irene Duthie in supplying refreshments as people arrived and then an amazing lunch in the Church Hall which was well received by everyone!

#### **C**ongregational Vote

On Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> May our congregation took a vote on whether or not we wished to disband the Forfar Parish Grouping. On the same day Lowson Memorial, St Margaret's and Dunnichen Letham Kirkden also voted with presbytery representatives in all churches. All the churches overwhelmingly voted for the dissolution of the Forfar Parish Grouping except St Margaret's who voted against. These results will be discussed at the presbytery meeting in June. As you know all the churches work very effectively under the FACT banner including non Church of Scotland churches.



Afternoon Tea/ Coffee morning – as you will know many members in the church are hosting

coffee mornings and lunches to raise funds for the church. A few ladies hosted an afternoon tea together in the social area on Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> May and invited their friends who had no connection to our church. A tour was given of the church and a very, very lovely afternoon was enjoyed by all. A total of **£336** was raised. The visitors have already asked when the next afternoon tea is!


**Presbytery Communion**

However our minister felt that she would like to acknowledge the dedication and commitment of the elders in our church by holding a special thanksgiving service for the work they do. A number of elders have left over the years due to health issues, age and the direction the church was going in so to that end we are also inviting past elders who are still members of the church to come along and be thanked for the work they were involved in over these many past years.

**Five yearly review** – every five years Presbytery carry out a five yearly review of the church and it covers a very wide area. It looks at the church's successes and also the challenges it faces. This review can be used as a tool to define where we are now and our vision for the coming years. Our minister, session clerk and depute session clerk have already filled in a mountain of paperwork and the date has been set for Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> June in the church where elders and members alike can come along and meet the presbytery representatives who will carrying out the review. If you are free on this evening please come along at 7.15pm. The results of this review will be put to our session and church and to presbytery at a later date.

#### Hungarian Twinning Service

Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> June is our Hungarian Twinning service and also the Groovy Gryphon prize giving. We also hope that we will be able to present our Duke of Edinburgh youths with their awards.



**Breakfast Church** – a number of people have been asking about holding a breakfast church so our minister has decided with the session's approval to give this a try. As you know the first of the month is our early morning service with communion so we plan to hold the breakfast church the following Sunday on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of the month at 9.30am also – hopefully this will easy for people to remember. 

The Treasurer has provided an example of monthly income and expenditure above. Like any organisation we need to balance our books and to meet any deficit we need to raise additional funding to ensure we are not left with unpaid bills. In the example our income for the month was £8,404.53 and our expenditure £10,587.68, a deficit of £2,183.15.

During the past six months Church income has been £52,682.36 and expenditure £62,629.02, a deficit of £9,946.66.

To clear our annual deficit the various groups run events throughout the year and as you see in our Annual Accounts, we end each year on a positive footing.

<u>Clearly any additional income would be very beneficial for the health of our</u> <u>finances. If you can consider reviewing your regular giving, then now might be a</u> <u>great time to do it.</u>
