#### A message from John Orr – Interim Moderator

Dealing with Presbytery processes can be a frustrating experience, and even more so when an error is made. I've no doubt there is plenty of speculation about why the vacancy process seems to have stalled, but the answer lies in a simple oversight by Presbytery. However, it has had a positive benefit. The hiccup highlighted the fact that there had been little consultation with the Kirk Session about the vacancy. This has now been remedied and, following a recent meeting, both the Session and Presbytery are clearer about the goals to be achieved. Another benefit is that we were able to make representations about the buildings at Inverarity and I understand that the situation has been clarified and there is now no issue, from Presbytery's perspective, to keeping both buildings. Of course, '121' needs to be on side and it is hoped that they too will agree with Presbytery's decision. The vacancy process will resume after the next Presbytery meeting in June. *In the meantime, Malcolm has been guiding us through various* changes and proposals that will bring long-term benefits to East, Old and Inverarity parish (EOI). These will see changes in responsibilities to ensure smooth day-to-day running of the congregations' work. They will lay foundations for developing missional work in both Forfar and Inverarity. They will encourage greater engagement with the Sunday services for those who are perhaps unable to attend church. Look out for these initiatives and give them your practical and prayerful support. I believe they will be of great benefit in making the charge of EOI even

#### **INVERARITY GUILD**

Illian Carnegie welcomed all to our meeting on 17<sup>th</sup> March. Speaker, Tim Podger, trainee minister, gave an illustrated talk of how his life had evolved. He grew up in the south of England, then attended Newcastle University, where he studied Chemical and Processing Engineering. Following this, he gained employment with ICI in Manchester and it was here he met his wife, Lyn. Tim's job took him abroad - Germany, America, Venice, Belgium, before returning to England and working for a spell in sales. He joined Merpro in Montrose in 2006 and came to live in Monikie with Lyn and his two sons, Tom and Ben.

Throughout his life, wherever he lived, Tim always found a church to worship in, and on coming to this area, he joined Murroes church and became an elder in 2015.

Around this time, Tim thought about retiring from work and following a different path in life. He then decided to embrace a role within the local ministry. His training began and placements were with Rev Linda Stevens, then Rev Karen Fenwick. He has been with Rev Carleen Robertson this past year.

His probationer period ends in June, when he will become a local ordained minister. We wish him well.

At our recent AGM in May, seven members attended, with two apologies. The Treasurer presented her report and it was agreed to give donations to the Sunday School, RDA riding school and Guild projects. Office Bearers:- Contact Secretary - Lillian Carnegie; Treasurer - Diane Acheson; Minute Secretary - June Richardson

**TNVERARITY** - In the past year, the National Church reviewed and graded all its buildings, excluding manses. East and Old Church was graded A which in essence means continue as before. Some churches, including St Margaret's, were graded B, which means close in the near future. Others, including Inverarity Church were graded B\* which, in simple terms, means tell us why you should be an A. The East, Old & Inverarity (EOI) Kirk Session agreed to support a request to Presbytery that the Inverarity Church building be upgraded from B\* to A. These are the reasons why I think it should be an A:

- Recently been re-adjusted and deserves a chance to consolidate and grow. The Union with East and Old was completed very shortly before its Minister resigned.
- [Revised] Mission Plan submitted in March awaiting a formal response. This is very much in line with the plan submitted for Farnell and Gardner Memorial.
- Offers a Rural Christian presence (3 rural churches within 10 miles have closed) and Inverarity is attracting new members because of this - at least 8 since February.
- Consolidating and growing links with the local primary school. The youngsters come to the Church for their end of term services, and we are currently investigating an after-school club using both the hall and the Church plus other uses of the Church by the School.
- Worship is easily accommodated on a Sunday with a 9:45am Service in Inverarity and 11:15am Service in East and Old.
- Openness to being flexible and innovative e.g., having a Celebrating Spring Service on a Sunday afternoon with no morning service. Over 50 attended this service with at least a dozen from E&O.
- Souper Fridays have begun with over 40 attending, including locals with no church connection, supporting community social events.
- There is an expanding programme of community events Men's Club now has 25 members (some coming out from Forfar). On 5th May we played host to the local Vintage Tractor Run, providing lunch and a chance to see round the Church. We now have a team structure within the sanctuary aimed at developing our impact.

- For Autumn, we are looking at a round of evening events in the Church, including concerts, talks and recitals.
- Attendance is solidly 20/30 adults and 2/7 children [tea, coffee and a blether after the service for 45-60 minutes is a valuable opportunity for sometimes isolated rural residents to keep in touch].
- There is a younger age profile with up to six young families worshipping on a Sunday.
- An active Sunday School that uses the Hall after the Children's address in the Church.
- Folks believe there is potential to become the West/Central Angus
  "District Rural Hub" with a potential role as farming hub. The Seeds
  for Growth Fund has indicated support for "market research" but
  needs a more certain medium-term future to justify spending money.
  If the Church is upgraded to an A, then discussions can take place
  with the local community, farming unions and the Royal Scottish
  Agricultural Benevolent Society.
- Church and halls are in sound fabric condition. Church has Wi-Fi and two large screen TVs for PowerPoint Projection.
- There is a desire to remove side aisle pews and create a display area. A current display over the pews details the history of the Church. The school has plans to create a new display highlighting their work and of course that could be followed by a Climate Change display!
- Folks are aware that there will be regular assessments of buildings and that an A today is not an "unrestricted call" just a chance to prove ourselves.
- There is strong support amongst worshipers at Inverarity Church and we believe that moving to A grading would underpin and increase that support. Over the past 10/15 years, the Congregation has come under West Angus Area Ministry (WAAM) Guardianship, and on reflection was managed and directed on a survival basis.
- The folks are working together with the Church as the core of their efforts and the hall as one means of their mission and outreach. They deserve a chance!

ive Marks of Mission

I have just completed a series of sermons on what the Church calls The Five Marks of Mission. These are meant to be a blueprint for Church growth and are:

- 1) To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- 2) To teach, baptize, and nurture new believers
- 3) To work for justice, peace, and reconciliation
- 4) To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth
- 5) To respond to human need by loving service.

Personally, I am not convinced by the language and indeed the focus. I would rather see:

- 1) To build and deepen relationships
- 2) To be inclusive and welcome all
- 3) To consider contemporary issues and give a lead based on love
- 4) To act, personally and collectively, to reduce our carbon footprint
- 5) To develop an approach to life based on a 24/7 spirituality.

The 2024 General Assembly runs from Saturday 18th May, with

29 Reports, all with recommendations, for example:

- Agree that the Church's financial situation demands further urgent attention supported by a focus on the agreed priorities;
- Continue to encourage uniting congregations to ensure that the Guild is involved in discussions and



- enabled to explore ways in which Guilds merge or work in new ways, welcoming those mergers that have taken place;
- Note the position in relation to Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2016 (Register of Persons Holding a Controlled Interest in Land)
   Regulations 2021;
- Commend the Church Hymnary Supplement 'God Welcomes All' and thank the Hymnary Supplement Committee for their work in producing this resource of contemporary songs supporting the renewal of worship;
- Reaffirm the ecumenical vision articulated in the Declaratory Act in line with the Third Article Declaratory (2010), and instruct the unincorporated entities of the Church of Scotland to take account of this in their future work;
- Urge political leaders and media institutions to avoid the use of dehumanising and hostile language when describing migrants, refugees and asylum seekers; and instruct the Faith Action Programme Leadership Team to work with partners in speaking out against this rhetoric.

#### **Christian Persecution**

Are you aware that each and every day, thousands of our fellow Christians in many countries face violence and persecution?

A recent Release International report states that for last year alone, 686 acts of violence were reported in 34 states across Nigeria, resulting in 4357 deaths and 1791 abductions. Sadly, the killing and kidnapping of believers continued unabated into the New Year. In January, 25 Christians were killed by terrorists in attacks on villages in Plateau State; Christian Daily News reported that thousands of people were displaced in violent attacks in Mangu County.

James Bitruss, a Christian Leader in the predominantly Christian Karakoram county, said terrorists had killed more than 100 believers in the past four months, and many thousands of people have been forced to flee their communities. This is just a small snapshot in one country, but similar tragedies are reported in many other areas. Remember that many thousands of small acts of daily violence go unreported.

Please support our struggling fellow Christians in your prayers:

- Pray for all Christians in Nigeria and elsewhere who have suffered immense persecution
- Ask God to help all those injured or traumatised by these acts of terror and to provide for those displaced by violence
- Pray for our partners as they work to help all those affected by these attacks
- > Pray that the perpetrators will repent and put down their weapons
