Loving God and Your Neighbour

When you choose to love Me with all your heart, all your mind, all your strength, and all your soul, I will teach you how to love your neighbour. When you experience intimate communion with Me, you will become more and more aware that you were created in My image just like every other person on earth. You will begin to see how deeply you're connected to all My creation.

Scripture: "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."

Matthew 22:36-40

Challenge: Don't lose sight of the call to love your neighbour.

In Matthew chapter 22, Jesus responded to a question about the greatest commandment by stating, 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' And the second is very much like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' He then emphasized that all the Law and the Prophets hinge on these two commandments.

Jesus summarized the theological discussion by saying two commandments define the character of a person's spiritual life and their relationship with God. The first commands us to love God, and the second compels us to love one another. Everything else written in the New Testament is a commentary on how we live out those commandments

Yet, as Church members do, we tend to concentrate on everything else but that truth? Let us commit to living a life of love rather than judgment, Remembering to embrace others and not judge others to see whether they believe exactly the way we do!

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

It is a year since our two churches, East & Old, and Inverarity united to form a new congregation, with a new, single Kirk Session: East, Old & Inverarity Parish. This has led to many new things. We have worked together, reviewing structures and reflecting on the 'old ways' and



considering new ways of achieving this union – a marriage of two churches coming together as one, and like all marriages, there has to be an element of compromise, give and take, sharing of resources and mutual support.

These are all things we are still working out, facing the challenges, and the many compromises to be made. People may say 'I wish we could go back to the way it was' but changes are inevitable and a part of life. Change can be unsettling and uncomfortable, but also a good thing, and we must put our trust in God's plan for us – many good things have and

will come out of this union, pushing us outside our comfort zone: the old, the familiar. This was the right time to unite, God's timing brought us to this union. Ecclesiastes chapter 3: 1-8, says this is the right time for us to have a new beginning and a fresh start, otherwise things may have become stale, too familiar or old. We are seeking new ways to bring the Good News of Christ to our community and our union allows us to do this.

In January 2024, just after our union was formalised, our minister suddenly announced she was leaving. We were in a new situation of having no minister. The national church is currently undergoing radical reform and restructuring, with major implications for the process of calling for a new minister. The process is long and complex, and many criteria need to be fulfilled. We are not quite there yet, though things are moving apace. To the outsider, it may look like nothing has happened in the last nine months! However, behind the scenes, much has been going on to prepare the way for a new minister of our newly formed congregation.

The manse was deemed unfit for purpose and under new criteria, not energy-efficient enough as a suitable home for a modern-day minister, and so our old manse would be sold, and a new one purchased. The sale of the manse and its replacement had to be agreed, firstly by our Kirk session, then Presbytery, then the national church and this has now been done. (see Property report on page 7) We will have a new manse very soon. In the intervening period, we have welcomed the part-time services of a locum minister, Rev Malcolm, on Sundays and conducting other worship-related duties. All the other work of the church is carried out by members. New leadership roles have been created to form an executive committee that oversees the running of the church. New members have joined existing teams. There is much to be done still, but a great deal has been achieved over the past year, as we move from the old to the new and ask God to guide us on this journey. We ask for your prayers as we embrace the new at East, Old and Inverarity Parish.

f acancy News - It is 9 months since East, Old and Inverarity moved into a vacancy period, where are we now? A summary of what has been happening:

- Presbytery granted East, Old & Inverarity permission to call a minister on a 7-year reviewable tenure.
- Inverarity church was graded B and a business plan created advocating that the church remained open.
- Vacancy Advisory Committee (VAC) comprising 2 impartial ministers and an elder, was set up by Perth
 Presbytery to advise Kirk Session on procedures. Two members,
 Catriona Morrison and Yvonne Grant met with Kirk Session on 18th
 March. VAC chair, Ian Gray, was not present.
- Kirk Session informed due process had not been followed by presbytery and thus a meeting with Presbytery Clerk John Ferguson and Neil Glover of Presbytery Planning Committee was arranged to discuss the situation.
- Committee changed Inverarity church building's status from grade B to A, allowing it to stay open, and approved the business plan.
- Kirk Session agreed to sell East & Old manse, deemed unsuitable as a modern family home for a future minister and inadequately energy efficient.
- Manse was valued and preparations made for going on the market.
- Kirk Session agreed to discuss motion to depart from historic Church of Scotland practice and permit applications from ministers in a samesex relationship.
- On 17th June, Kirk Session discussed the motion and voted motion was carried. Working group was set up to produce a draft parish profile for Kirk Session approval following Church of Scotland guidelines.
- Interim Moderator John Orr called for nominations for electing a nominating committee to choose a new minister.

Property Team Report - Headline news is the East Manse has been sold. We wish the new owners Phillip and Julie Grant all the best in their new home. If you come across them, I hope you make them most welcome in the town.

The funds from the sale are held on our behalf at church headquarters in Edinburgh. From these funds we need to purchase a replacement manse for our new minister. Discussions have been held over many months to identify a home that meets the ministerial requirements, a big part of the picture looking for our new minister.

As always, church repairs and maintenance are ongoing. Some examples: a gas leak at the pavement outside East & Old meant no heating for a few days. At least the weather was warm for the time of year. The electricity had gremlins that became frustrating but is fully functioning again. Inverarity realised that the new Kids Club needed a baby changing facility. Many more minor repairs have been dealt with.

The property team are involved with projects to investigate and implement on your behalf over the winter and into the spring and we'll keep you up to date.

for Macmillan Cancer Support and at the October lunch we raised £155.70 for Poppy Scotland!



Malcolm and Chris married in Clackmannan Parish Church in the early seventies and a recent happy photograph showed how the family has grown.


