**acancy Update** - In the previous Inspire, we thought we had the goahead to call a minister, having prepared our Parish Profile to share with prospective ministers, as well as a webpage dedicated to the charge of East, Old & Inverarity.

Soon afterwards, we ran into various administrative difficulties as a Kirk Session, which led to our former Interim Moderator, Rev John Orr, resigning and Rev Carleen Robertson taking his place. Perth Presbytery took the unusual step of putting our call on hold for three months to allow Kirk Session to resolve some issues. In the intervening period, East, Old and Inverarity Kirk Session worked with Presbytery's Congregational Support Team, Presbytery Clerk, Rev John Ferguson and the Vacancy Advisory Committee who advise the nomination committee. I'm pleased to say that Rev Ferguson intimated that the Presbytery Business Committee reinstated permission and we were in a good position to call a minister. Therefore, as of 10th May, we received the go-ahead, finally! By the time you read this, the vacancy webpage will be up and running again. **Property Report** - I hope you are enjoying this wonderful weather. What a difference in a year. My potato planting is finished almost five weeks earlier this year and so much easier on man and machine.



One real benefit with this weather is allowing work on the window repairs at Inverarity, followed by painting. These windows may well be the original ones installed when the kirk was expanded to two levels in 1845. A good clue to

old windows is the glass. Today, windowpanes should be completely clear but back then, the glass had many imperfections, often giving them an opaque look. Craftsmen joiners are doing the repair work and using seasoned hardwood for longevity. Can we hope for another 180 years? Also at Inverarity, a small section has been cleared of pews as per the agreement with Presbytery. If anyone would like a pew, please get in touch.

Although the current biggest project is at Inverarity, many items are being attended to at East and Old. As an example, I'm pleased to note that the lift is now fully operational again following a challenge to get replacement parts. Shortly the west stairwell area will be clad to match the main east entrance and also the paintwork freshened up on the staircases.

Have you noticed the new lighting in the Social Area? The faulty old lights were going to be seriously expensive to replace and the wholesaler refused to guarantee a replacement would work with the system in place. As a bonus for an Eco Congregation, the new lights use much less electricity.

The sound system in the sanctuary is being reviewed. A couple of minor tweaks so far should have helped. There is also a question whether the hearing loop system is operating as it should.

The books we have read these past three months: Only Time Will Tell' by Jeffrey Archer. I may have reported on that one last time! However a few of us have continued reading the books in this series about

the Clifton Family, shipping and banking magnates always fighting to stay afloat, literally and financially.

'Precipice' by Robert Harris. A renowned author of historical novels and thrillers such as 'Conclave', deftly weaves fact and fiction into best sellers. This book is about Prime Minister Asquith around the time of WW1 when he was in love with a young socialite and shared sensitive matters of state with her. As they were not always discreet, their affair was no secret. An investigation by special services ensued. Good reading!

'The Wager' by David Grann. He is the author of 'Killers of the Flower Moon' that was made into a film. This story is quite different, taking place during the Spanish Armada when Spain's ships sailed to undiscovered lands and the British chased them across the Atlantic for their treasures. During these battles, British naval ship The Wager is shipwrecked off Patagonia in the South Atlantic. A struggle to survive with a mutinous crew ensues. This story is told through ship logs rescued with the men when they returned home.
